# Tales from the Trails June 2023 - Crazy Horse and More....

So for all who have thought about walking Crazy Horse Memorial <a href="https://www.bing.com/search?q=crazy+horse+monument&form">horse+monument&form</a>, I recommend that you try this once in a lifetime event (or walk it again). More

on that in a moment. So Susan and I are walking the 50 states and their respective state capitals. We now just need Hawaii, California, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico to finish. Even when we attended the 2017 AVA convention in Billings, Montana, we did not walk either the South Dakota capital Pierre (pronounced Pier) or North Dakota and its capital in Bismarck. So this year we decided to make these two states a priority. We flew out of San Antonio early on 31 May and flew to Minneapolis, Minnesota and then drove to Sioux Falls.

In Sioux Falls we walked the Big Sioux River Trail (1414). Sioux Falls is a lovely town with any number of social amenities. The trail goes from downtown, roughly following the Big Sioux River north to Falls Park then returns south to downtown and takes you by any number of Historic buildings and Churches.

We left Sioux Falls and continued our trek south and west to Rapid City to ensure that we would be available on 3 June to walk Crazy Horse. Rapid City, also a great town and we choose the President's walk (Y0045). This trail takes you around the downtown area and some of the near suburbs. The city sometime in the recent past made an investment in creating life-size metal statues of all our presidents and placed them at various intersections. Rapid City also maintains an impressive number of historic buildings and churches.

So Saturday 3 June was the Crazy Horse walk (124221) which is about 25 miles south and west of Rapid City. The Crazy Horse Memorial is a mountain monument under construction on privately held land in the Black Hills (from Wikipedia) For those who have not been in this area the mountains are spectacular. The entry fee to the grounds was waived if you donated canned goods and we arrived early since Susan was a volunteer for the event. So I registered around 7:00 A.M. and we were allowed to start at 8:00 A.M. The first half of the walk (woodland trails) is fairly difficult (4C) but made even more treacherous by the number of people who started when I did (about 12 to 13 hundred walkers).

Also, it had rained the previous evening and this part of the trail was rather muddy. So the trail finally ends and puts you on a series of packed gravel roads that circumvent a portion of the base of the mountain. The last 2K (or so) up the mountain is fairly steep (about a 7% or 8% grade, at least). On a personal note. I found it easier to walk in 2017. A number for walkers, at this event, that I heard was in excess of 4,000 for the day. Thus if you want a challenge, the next opportunity to walk Crazy Horse is early in October 2023. Also saw Terry Tyler from Kansas who has supported the Texas Trail Roundup (IML) over the past few years along with John McCllen, AVA vice-chair and his wife.

We left the next morning from Rapid City and drove to Pierre. Pierre, a small town on the Missouri River has any number of recreational opportunities that walkers may avail themselves. In this case the capital sits just north of downtown and the walk (Y0768) goes through neighborhoods and part of the commercial district. Again, a number of historic buildings are on the trail. From Pierre, we drove to Bismarck, North Dakota. The capitol area sits just north of downtown and is also a lovely area to walk through (Y0939) and see various historic buildings. The North Dakota state capitol building is one of four in the United States that is not a variant of the U.S. capitol and the city is also on the Missouri river. The trail is through both historical, commercial and neighborhood areas,

We continued east to Fargo. Susan and I walked (Y2817) through the downtown, a historical area. The city is very commercial and represents North Dakota's contribution to our national annual grain harvest. From Fargo we drove to Bloomington, Minnesota and had an opportunity to walk the Mall of America (Y0381) prior to returning to San Antonio on 9 June.

This short article does not do justice to the various walks in the Dakotas or Minnesota, the many historical sites or points of interest available to us all. For instance, just off the highway from Pierre to Bismarck lies Laurence Welk's family home and museum. By any measure an enjoyable trip. John

**Great Springs Project** 



Are you ready to walk from San Antonio to Austin? The Great Springs Project aims to transform the journey with a trail network that links the two cities, water sources and communities.

About a third of the trail already exits. The nonprofit, The Great Springs Project, hopes to complete the multimillion-dollar trail network by 2036. It's using both public and private funds to create new portions of the trail and to connect into existing portions.

The trail will run north from the springs at the Blue Hole at Incarnate Word through Live Oak, University City, Selma through the Comal Springs in New Braunfels. The trail will end up at Barton Springs in Austin.

Thanks to the expert guidance of Alta Planning + Design, Great Springs Project is pleased to present the Great Springs Trails Plan for the proposed 100+ mile spring-to-spring network of trails from the Alamo to the Capitol. This plan is a living document that serves as a resource for the completion of the trail network by the Texas Bicentennial in 2036.

Sections of the trail will likely be built in phases, with the order of phases depending on key factors such as funding, landowner negotiation, establishing right-of-way, permitting, design, and construction. This plan represents a major step forward on the path to implementation.

Through collaboration with our many partners, Great Springs Project unifies and supports existing local efforts and catalyzes new efforts to address the most critical water, land, wildlife, and public health and equity challenges facing the Central Texas region. https://greatspringsproject.org/





USFWF sponsors 3 annual walks:

A one-day walk in May to visit the Embassy Open Houses in Washington DC (IVV/AVA), alternating between the European Union Open Houses and the rest of the world Open Houses.

A two-day walk, in conjunction with NBC4 Health & Fitness Expo. Dates vary in the first part of the year, January - March each year.

A three-day walk starting in Arlington, VA the third weekend in October. (IVV and IML), exploring Arlington and Washington, DC with distances as short as 5 km (3miles) and as long as 21 km (a half marathon).

We also sponsor walk events and a bike event that can be walked (or ridden if bike route) throughout the year at the participant's convenience.
